## ***Disaster Assistance Available for Small Businesses***

**Sacramento, CA** – Small, non-farm businesses in twenty-six counties are eligible to apply for low interest disaster loans. These loans are to offset economic losses because of reduced revenue to farmers and ranchers caused by adverse weather conditions in the California counties of **Butte, Fresno, Glenn, Merced, Sutter** and **Yuba**, announced Alfred E. Judd, Disaster Area Director of the U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA).

Small businesses in the following primary and adjacent counties may apply for economic losses that are attributable to the following weather conditions and incident dates:

**Butte, Glenn and Yuba (adjacent counties of Colusa, Lake, Mendocino, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Sierra, Sutter and Tehama)** –unseasonable high temperatures and low humidity from March 12 through March 15, 2004.

**Fresno (adjacent counties of Inyo, Kings, Madera, Merced, Mono, Monterey, San Benito and Tulare)** – unseasonable hot weather from March 4 through March 31, 2004.

**Merced (adjacent counties of Fresno, Mariposa, Madera, San Benito, Santa Clara and Stanislaus)** – abnormally high temperatures and windy conditions on March 25.

**Sutter (adjacent counties of Butte, Colusa, Placer, Sacramento, Yolo and Yuba)** – severe high temperatures and low humidity from March 9 through March 22, 2004.

Small businesses may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) of up to \$1.5 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses, which could have been met had the disaster not occurred. “Eligibility for these working capital loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only, and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 2.9%, a maximum term of 30 years, and are restricted to businesses without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship,” Judd said.

By law, SBA makes EIDLs available when the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. Secretary Ann M. Veneman declared these disasters at the request of the Director of the Office of Emergency Services, on behalf of Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are ineligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency (FSA) about the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration.
