LESS THAN A MONTH TO APPLY FOR DISASTER ASSISTANCE IN BAKER COUNTY

ATLANTA - The U.S. Small Business Administration is reminding small businesses that January 20 is the filing deadline for federal economic injury disaster loans available in Baker County, Florida. The SBA declared a disaster as a result of freezing temperatures that occurred February 3-7, 2009.

“Baker County is eligible because it is contiguous to a declared primary county in the State of Georgia. The SBA recognizes that disasters do not usually stop at county or state lines. For that reason, counties adjacent to primary counties named in the declaration are included,” said Frank Skaggs, director of SBA’s Field Operations Center East.

“When the Secretary of Agriculture issues a disaster declaration to help farmers recover from damages and losses to crops, the Small Business Administration issues a declaration to assist small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives and most private non-profit organizations of all sizes affected by the same disaster,” Skaggs added.

Under this declaration, the SBA’s Economic Injury Disaster Loan program is available to eligible entities that suffered financial losses as a direct result of this disaster. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply to SBA.

Eligible small businesses and non-profit organizations may qualify for loans up to \$2 million. These loans are available at a 4 percent interest rate with loan terms up to 30 years. The SBA determines eligibility based on the size of the applicant, type of activity and its financial resources. Loan amounts and terms are set by the SBA and are based on each applicant’s financial condition. Under this disaster declaration, the SBA cannot provide loans to agricultural producers.

Completed loan applications must be returned to SBA no later than January 20, 2009.
