Graded Agency:

At the Department of Justice (DOJ), small businesses have a vital role in the successful delivery of the Department's complex and critically important law enforcement and national security missions. The Department's leadership and its employees remain committed to the nation's small businesses to help achieve those missions in FY2014 and beyond. In FY2013, DOJ worked to maximize opportunities in its contracting for small businesses, SDBs, WOSBs, HUBZone firms, and SDVOSBs.

DOJ is proud that it exceeded the government-wide statutory goal of awarding 23% of its contracting dollars to small businesses by awarding 26.16% of its dollars to small businesses despite operating under a sequestration constrained budget. DOJ is also proud that it again exceeded the statutory goals for SDBs and WOSBs. DOJ is actively looking to increase its awards to small businesses and is seeking opportunities that allow greater participation by SDVOSBs and HUBZone firms. DOJ will continue to work closely with its large prime contractors to sustain their success in the SDB and WOSB categories and to increase SDVOSB and HUBZone results. Lastly, DOJ will continue to work with SBA on small business matters.
